Rev Sam Torrens writes...

Dear Friends,

¹⁷ And I pray that you, being rooted and established in love, ¹⁸ may have power, together with all the Lord's holy people, to grasp how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Christ, ¹⁹ and to know this love that surpasses knowledge—that you may be filled to the measure of all the fullness of God.

Ephesians 3: 17-19

What a month it has been in the life of Gorgie and Palmerston Place Church. On 11th May the congregation gathered in Gorgie Church to hear Rev Trish Archibald preach as Sole Nominee and thereafter elect her with an overwhelming expression of support as the new Minister Elect.

Then, the excitement was barely settling when the congregation met together again, this time in Palmerston Place Church to celebrate the 150th anniversary of mission and ministry from the Palmerston Place side of the union. There we enjoyed fantastic fellowship, a scrumptious lunch, welcomed back many old friends, interacted with various groups, participated in Christ centred worship and heard a very timely and apposite word from the guest preacher, the Very Rev Colin Sinclair, former minister of Palmerston Place Church and former Moderator of the General Assembly. His words still live in me!

While Colin offered the congregation a word of "congratulations" it was rather measured recognising that we stand on the shoulders of those who went before us and are no longer with us. But on the back of those congratulations there came the more pointed challenges to "commitment" and to "courage" in the hope that with committed, courageous, resilience we will create with God something that will bless the future generations.

Referring to the exiled remnant in Babylon, Colin encouraged us from Jeremiah 29: 11 to trust in, and align ourselves with, the plans of God. A message that had been given earlier to the children by Fiona Edwards in her engaging all-age talk.

We left, well I certainly did, fed spiritually and physically, and with gratitude to all involved in making it a memorable day and weekend! Two uplifting events, and sandwiched between them was the General Assembly! Yes, there were real challenges regarding finances and the future but there was also a bright theme of "Extravagant Love" which reminds me not only of God but of Julian of Norwich. During the Dark Ages amidst the Black Death when the Church had become disconnected from ordinary people, a young woman in the throes of death was given the last rites and there, on the cush of death, she encountered Christ and experienced repeated Revelations of Divine Love. She miraculously revived and was to spend the next 20 years confining herself to a small room within a church in Norwich discovering from the Bible that God is a God of Extravagant Love. In those Revelations she heard the living Christ say, 'all shall be well, all shall be well, and all manner of things shall be well,' Mary Peters the hymn writer captured it beautifully in the hymn:

Through the love of God our Saviour, all will be well. Free and changeless is his favour, all, all is well. Precious is the blood that healed us, perfect is the grace that sealed us, strong the hand stretched forth to shield us, all must be well.

And so it shall be!

²⁰ Now to him who is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine, according to his power that is at work within us, ²¹ to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus throughout all generations, for ever and ever! Amen. (Ephesians 3: 20-21)

Sunday 11th May was the day we'd all been waiting for, some with curiosity, some with trepidation, all with excitement.

The Nominating Committee had invited Rev Trish Archibald to preach as Sole Nominee and the day had finally arrived, bathed in bright sunshine. Our candidate arrived in good time with her husband Gareth and their three daughters Rachel, Naomi and Sophia.

We hoped the preparations were all in order as the congregation began to arrive and their names were ticked off the electoral roll in exchange for a voting slip. It would be quite simple, there was only one question to be answered; please vote for or against Trish becoming our minister – put an X in the box of your choice.

As we approached 11 o'clock the buzz of conversation was at its height with the sanctuary full and a few people in the gallery. The chatter soon settled as the words of welcome were offered and the service got underway with Trish leading the Call to Worship.

The hymns were all familiar and sung with such enthusiasm that had our neighbours been gathered next door, we may have been heard around the stadium!

We could all relate to the All Age Talk and later listened intently to the sermon based on John 15: 1-17, "I Am the True Vine."

The service drew to a close and after the Archibald family left the sanctuary for a well-earned tea, coffee or cold drink, our Interim Moderator Rev Sam Torrens explained what would happen next.

The voting slips were collected and while they were counted, the congregation also enjoyed hot or cold drinks.

The outcome of the vote was shared with Trish, her family and the joint Session Clerks before being intimated to the congregation: of 99 votes, 92 voted for, four voted against, and three were unmarked papers.



Spontaneous applause erupted and as Trish returned to the sanctuary it became even louder and was sustained for many minutes – she was in no doubt of the warm welcome from the congregation of Gorgie and Palmerston Place Church. As things began to settle down people were invited to sign the Call if they had been eligible to vote, or a document of Concurrence if they are associated with the congregation, while the family enjoyed chatting to some of the congregation.



Afterwards they all visited the manse followed by lunch with the joint Session Clerks at a local restaurant – a busy and exciting day for us all.

We expect the Call to be sustained at the next meeting of Presbytery and a date given for the Induction service.

As some are aware, traditionally the congregation gifts robes to ministers being inducted to their first charge and Trish has been asked if she'd like clerical wear, or whether she has another preference related to her work. She is very grateful for the generous offer and is giving it some thought.
































150th Anniversary Celebration Banner Palmerston Place Church 1875-2025

The Banner takes the form of the front elevation of the church.

The Steps:

There are seven steps with the words thankful and hopeful. (Seven often represents completeness in biblical terms.)

The Four Pillars:

These stand for the 4 gospels on which our faith is founded.

The Doors:

The steps lead to the three red double doors with symbols representing the life of Christ and His church: from left to right;

the star of the nativity; a symbol for Christ's birth;

the three crosses on a hill; a reminder of His death on the cross;

the flames on the central doors represent the coming of the Holy Spirit;

the cup of communion; when His church remembers His sacrifice together;

finally the throne of Jesus, King of Heaven and Earth.

The North Tower:

The window symbols; A Sunflower for joy and hope Clasped hands for love and compassion A Treble Clef stands for praise

The South Tower:

The window symbols; The scales for truth and justice The open Bible for faith The Praying Hands

The 5 Upper Floor windows:

The Outlines of the four churches with which we are united;

Gorgie (GDS), Lothian Road., Palmerston Place, and Belford Road, with the Burning Bush, symbol of the Church of Scotland in the middle: ('nec tamen consumebatur -however it was not consumed').

The churches show the faces of many people inside as this is the true definition of 'church': It is not just a building.

Central Dove of Promise:

This was the symbol of the United Presbyterian Church and is a spectacular centrepiece on the Sanctuary ceiling. (Similar smaller doves appear on the towers)

Made to express our gratitude to God; His gifts of creativity and for the joy of working together in our church family.

Sounds Familiar?

While rooting around in the Palmerston Place archives we found this....

Dear Member of Session,

I am writing this letter to you because I feel very sincerely that we have reached a point of crisis both in the Church of Scotland as a whole and in Palmerston Place in particular. An urgent call to the whole church, signed by three former Moderators and the Principal Clerk of the General Assembly, states that 'Taken as a whole, and on a national level, the situation in the Church of Scotland is very discouraging. '....... It is in this context that I address myself to you, praying that you will be sympathetic to this appeal which I make to you from my position of leadership in Palmerston Place. Almost suddenly signs of crisis have crept up on our congregation. I list three of them.

- (I) The massive problem of holding young people to church loyalty being felt throughout the land is now blowing through our own ranks like a chilling wind. The overall number of young people attaching themselves to our church has been significantly eroded and we must see that the decline is halted.
- (II) Over against this, the number of elderly people who are hospitalised or housebound and unable to attend the worship of the church with any semblance of regularity, this part of our congregation grows apace month by month and is one of the most marked features of our congregational life.
- (III) A third area where crisis appears to be creeping up on us is in church attendances. It is very difficult to assess this but indications seem to be that the growing pressures of city life are causing members to absent themselves more from the services of the church..... As you well know, energetic attempts have been made to stir up spiritual interest among the residents of our parish and this task will be continued with undiminished zest.

Nevertheless, the response to this outgoing action has not been such as to fill the heart with delight and obviously the process of winning a response is going to be long term.

In view of these and other issues, it is paramount that we all have our church very much in our prayers. We need to bring fresh, concerted and thoughtful study to Its wellbeing. We need to give it a real priority in our lives. In this exercise I would offer certain guidelines.In short, all our visiting needs to be sharpened and given a spiritual focus, ceasing to be a dull routine duty. In May of this year three of our elders reported to us from a conference in Crieff: Mature church membership was defined as (a) regular worship (b) daily prayer (c) involvement in a congregation's, work and witness!! (d) giving In self denial (e) learning from the Bible. Here is challenging material to discuss with any and every member.

"Thank you for your years of service. You will be missed by all."




"Well done Sandy. You have done a wonderful job."

Once on the bus, as on the way down, we were well looked after with the offer of sweets and cold drinks.




After a few more stops there was only around half the original number arriving back at the church.

With all the excitement of 150th Anniversary celebrations and a new Ministry beginning, the Edinburgh Festival is creeping up on us almost unobserved.

Searchlight Theatre Company are joining us again with six shows, old and new, in weeks 2 and 3, and for the first time the theatre company, **LAMPS collective** are joining us for week 1. (The acronym stands for **Love**, **Action**, **Music**, **Poetry**, **Stories**.)

Searchlight Theatre enjoyed an excellent run at the Fringe at Palmerston Place last year - almost 1500 people crossed the threshold attending one or more of the performances.

LAMPS will present two shows: The Passion and a musical drama Salt and Light.

Both companies will present two shows each evening, Wednesday to Friday with a matinee on Saturdays.

Week 1 6th – 9th August
Week 2 13th – 16th August
Week 3 20th – 23rd August

Tickets are available for all shows from the Edinburgh Fringe Box Office website or Ticket Office.

None of this would be possible without the willing support of many in the congregation, providing accommodation, baking and meals; and the small army of Stewards required for each performance. Susan Kidston as chief steward has once again agreed to be present every day, liaising with the actors and organising the stewards: without her input this Outreach would not be possible. Our Comms. Coordinator, Gregor Innes, also has a vital part to play in advertising on social media and elsewhere.

It was pleasing last year to see the church doors wide open daily, welcoming, and so many people coming in, looking around, chatting, as they had a cup of coffee or tea. Given the excellent level of congregational support in 2024, I trust that everyone thinks this will once again be a valuable Outreach during Festival 2025.

Both Searchlight and LAMPS collective aim to provide quality drama with a strong Christian message and we are glad to provide a venue to support their witness at the Edinburgh Festival Fringe.
